Located in the wilds of Southeast Alaska, Steamboat Bay Fishing Club is an exclusive venue for angling adventures with family and friends, creating memories to last a lifetime.

REMOTE ISLAND PRIVACY

Set amid the majestic Tongass National Forest, the Club presides on remote Noyes Island. Uninhabited save for Club members, guests, and crew, its 31 square miles provide luxurious privacy for an idyllic getaway.

ULTIMATE ACCESS

At the same time, Club guests enjoy the nearest access to the region's most celebrated fishing spots, storied locations such as Pineapple, Rockpile, and Granite.

Simply put, Steamboat Bay Fishing Club is the closest lodge to the best fishing in Southeast Alaska And after fishing, guests can enjoy bay kayaking, our Slavic *banya*-style sauna, the hot tub, and wildlifewatching from the nature trail, with an eye out for humpback whales and bald eagles.











Spectacular Sport Fishing

Here in Southeast Alaska, spring runoff, a craggy coastline, and a confluence of ocean currents create ideal habitat for millions of bait fish that draw the epic salmon schools and dozens of other fish species.

Anglers fish aboard our fleet of 27-foot cruisers, all outfitted with heated cabins, private heads, dual outboards, satellite radio, charging stations for personal electronics, and state of the art marine technology.

KING AND SILVER SALMON

This largest of Pacific salmon species, kings are prized for their exhilarating fight and their sweet, rich flavor. Late summer sees a bounty of silvers (another chef's favorite), the dazzling acrobats on the line.

HALIBUT, LINGCOD, AND ROCKFISH

Also abundant in our waters, halibut is favored for its buttery taste. Lingcod yields light and flaky fillets. And more than 20 species of rockfish in our waters ensure that Club guests are always on the bite.

Seamless Travel

As remote as it is accessible, Steamboat Bay is reached via Ketchikan, Alaska, just a 90-minute flight from Seattle, Washington.

GROUND CREW IN KETCHIKAN

Club guests fly in to Ketchikan, where our airport ground crew assists with luggage and transfers. Overnighting guests may enjoy exploring Creek Street to experience this historic port's culture, shopping, and dining.

FLOATPLANE TO NOYES ISLAND

From Ketchikan, guests travel via floatplane over Alaska's famed Inside Passage to Noyes Island and Steamboat Bay. Club crew meets all planes and valets luggage, so arriving guests can proceed directly to their boats and head straight to the fishing grounds.

DEPARTURE DAY EASE

On their departure day, Club guests and their fish boxes are checked in to their final destinations by our ground crew at Ketchikan International Airport. Guests are free to relax and enjoy the trip home.
